Liturgist: It is expected of all who continue in The United Methodist Church that they shall continue to evidence their desire of salvation.

People: First, by doing no harm.

Liturgist: By avoiding evil of every kind, especially that which is most generally practiced.

People: By not taking the name of the Lord in vain.

Liturgist: By not profaning the day of the Lord. either by doing ordinary work therein or by buying and selling.

People: By not buying or selling spiritous liquors or drinking them.

Liturgist: By not fighting or quarreling, or going to law brother against brother.

People: By not returning evil for evil, or railing for railing.

Liturgist: By not indulging in uncharitable or unprofitable conversation, nor in speaking evil of others.

People: By not doing to others as we would not have them do unto us.

Liturgist: By not doing what we know is not for the glory of God.

People: By not taking such diversions as cannot be used in the name of the Lord Jesus.

Liturgist: By not singing those songs, or reading those books, which do not tend to the knowledge of the love of God.

People: By not giving away to softness and needless self-indulgence.

Liturgist: By not laying up treasures on earth.

People: By not borrowing without the probability of repaying, or taking up goods without the probability of paying for them.

People: Second, by doing good.

Liturgist: By being in every kind merciful after their power.

People: As they have opportunity, doing good of every possible sort, and as far as possible, to all men.

People: To their souls, by instructing, reproving or exhorting all we have any dealings with.

CALL TO REDEDICATION

Minister: Come ye, all ye United Methodists, and let us walk in the light of the Lord. And he will teach us His ways, and we will walk in His paths. How did you, each of you, become a member of the church?

<u>People</u>: I was admitted into the fellowship of Christ's people by baptism, and was made a member of the church by confessing my faith, taking the vows of loyalty, and by receiving the right hand of fellowship.

# THIS IS MY CHURCH

## Rev. 3:14-22

Several years ago in one of our larger cities the communists purchased a protestant church building. Set in the midst of a mixed population, the Protestants felt they could no longer financially maintain the church. So they duly sold the property to the communist group for \$100,000.

The communists, made up of working people, invested an additional \$200,000 to enlarge and reovate the building. Where the Protestants could not get enough money to operate the church, the communists raised \$300,000 immediately. They reopened the building on a Sunday morning. The 3 hour session from 9-12 AM centered around the beliefs and strategies of communisn and atheism. At the close of the session each member took a package of propaganda material to distribute thru the week.

Here is what one of the communist leaders said to Dr Sharp, who tells the story: "I admit you have in the gospel of Christ a more powerful weapon for renovating society than we communists have in Marxism, but we will beat you in the end....Read in your scriptures the story of Gideon and the 300. We are Gideonites, we mean business. We give all our money over and above living expenses, and all our spare time over and above work and rest, to propagate communism. You give only a little fragment of your time and very little of your money for the propagation of your gospel of Christ. What good is your gospel if you don't practice it, propagate it, sacrifice for it? We will beat you in the end because we believe in our gospel of communism. We will sacrifice for it and take life and death chances for its success".

That puts it sort of bluntly to each one who calls himself Christian. And herein is found the real challenge of communism or any other ism.

Are we willing to do as much for the Christian gospel and our Christ as the communist is for his beliefs; as the materialist is in fostering his atheism? The fact that there are fewer than 100,000 communists in the USA contrasted to over 100,000,000 church members makes the reference to Gideon very much to the point. What if every member of every local church were to give Christ the kind of support this communist leader claimed his group was giving to atheistic communism? Should we expect anything less from church members?

A pagan writer in 112 AD wrote with high regard for the loyalty which the early Christians exhibite toward Christ and in the world. Pliny the Younger wrote of the spread of Christianity in his province in a letter to the Emperor Tragan. He speaks of the decline of the market for animals as a result of the decrease in animal sacrifice and of the resultant effect on the grain market. Pliny held the Christians accpuntable for the falling market. He says: "The Christian assemble before daylight and sing hymns to Christ as God". He reports them to honest upright people but they showed "obstinacy and unbending perversity" in their refusal to worship the emperor,

Those Christians to which Pliny referred had taken vows of loyalty to Christ and they held fast to those vows, come what might.

It was May 24, 1738, that John Wesley, the founder of the United Methodist Church, had what has come to be called the Aldersgate experience. In a sense it is the birthdate of our denomination. This Sunday we are observing as confirmation Sunday. and it seems appropriate to think about our own commit ment....especially when others in our land and world are making strong commitments to laien creeds.

If it is true that Christian commitment today does not a match the commitment which others are making to their faiths - be it communism, secularism, playboyism. etc - what is it to which we Methodists have committed ourselves to?

Perhaps the best way for us to do this is to look at the membership vows. Let's take a look.

There are five promises and professions which each United Methodist made at one time or another. Do you remember?

I. Do you...renew the solemn promise and vow that you made or that was made in your name, at your baptism?

2. Do you confess Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior and pledge your allegiance to his Kingdom?

3. Do you receive and profess the Christian faith as con-

tained in the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments?

4. Do you promise according to the grace given you to live a Christian life and always remain a faithful member of Christ's holy Church?

5. Will you be loyal to the United Methodist Church and uphold it by your prayers, yourpresence, your gifts and your service?

In a day when we hear much about the church, and much of it critical, we who are church members should be brave enough to admit that if members of the church took these vows seriously the church would continue to make its witness in the world. A good question to ask yourself is: "What would my church be like if all of it members were like me?"

But the church's witness depends solely upon the loyalty of each individual member. It depends on your loyalty

Gerald Kennedy tells about a church out west. It was old abandoned and put up for sale. There had been no services for many years and the denominational authorities decided it would be wise to dispose of the property. But a storm of protest arose and the local paper was filled with letters writen by i = 1rate citizens who objected to the sale of the church.

Kennedy reports that one of the people who had served the church remarked that if the people had shonw that much interest when the church was open, the church would not have b een abandoned. So with any church. It needs the interest and enthusiasm of its members while it is alive and active. And that is our obligation. We took a vow of membership to do just that.

Will you be loyal to the United Methodist Church and uphold it by your prayers, your presence, your gifts, and your service: Let's consider that briefly.

"Will you be loyal" to Christ thru that branch of his church which is called Methodist....

How are you loyal...well the second part amplifies and suggests how: "And uphold by your prayers, your presence, your gifts, and your service".

There it is as plain as day...the vow you took. What have your done with it thru the years?

Have you prayed for your church, for its pastors, for its members, for its ministry, for its future, for its needs? In fact . . have you prayed at all . .except maybe for yourself? How the church would be strengthened if each member were a praying member. If we had as much prayer as we do back-biting and critical members then what progress in name of Christ we could make. Remember, Jesus says: "Let him who is without sin cast the first stone" . . Or let him whose loyalty to Christ is above reproach speak the first word ofscorn and criticism.

Have you been present . . . or has your loyalty to other things sometimes exceeded your loyalty to Christ. This presence means more than attending church, of course. It really has to do with being a vital member of the Christian community as that community seeks to express itself and to function thru the United Methodist Church. It means involvement in experiences which will equip you to do the task which Christ has given you..the tasks of ministering, of healing, of redeeming, of lifting. To do that fully will demand more of your presence than just Sunday Morning for an hour.

But then...that was your promise as you once stood in the presence of God and in the presence of a Community of his people.

Have you given. How have you done. Are you a non-tipper? Are you a token giver? The church stands in need of more sharers and more sacrificial givers.

Of course you were aware when you made that vow that the traditional standard of giving for a Christian is the tithe .. 10%. Oh, maybe the preacher didn't tell you at the time, but hardly a soul is alive which does not know of this tradition, this command of God. What progress have you made toward this standard of giving since you made that promise?

And how about your service. The pressing need just for an adwquate . . in numbers Sunday school teaching staff . . indicates that we do not have 700 members who take that vow seriously. My friends, we should not have to burden a few people with the job of recruting leaders, teachers, etc. Christare servants, they are interested and greatly desire that their faith be propagated. Really? ?

Empty words for many....but the full life for some.
