Mnay today are struggling to keep the real meaning of Christmas in the forefront of their minds. Many people worship their desire to the Christmas regularly and that probably a sign. We don't want to be like the little girl who was on Santa Claus's lap. She give him a long list of expensive things which she wanted for Christmas and then without a word of appreciation she jumped off his lap and started toward her mother. Her concerned mother spoke quickly, "Honey, haven't you forgotten something?" The little girl thought for a moment then said to Santa Clause "Charge it".

The meaning of Christmas has to do with heavenly signs and angels' songs. It has to do with startled shepkers and kneeling wise men. It has to do with a world alive with messages of divine perpose and promise.

"Sing unto the Lord, for he hath done excellent things"
writes Isaiah. "Sing, of daughter of Zion; shout for joy,
O Israel, be glad and rejoice with all the heart, O daughter of
Jerusalem. The Lord has taken away his judgements" kings

Zephaniah.

Christmas is the celebration of God's intervention in human affairs. That is the place to begin if we are to understand its meaning. It celebrates what God has done.

The Jewish scholar, Montefiroe, has shown that, when compare to Judaism, there is only one teaching we find in Jesus but do not find in Jewish teachings before him. That is the teaching that

God is like a shepherd who goes out to look for the lost sheep.

Jesus always believed that God was a God of love and forgivenes and, that, if a sinner repented, God would freely forgive him.

But Jesus taught that God would not wait for the sinner to repeat. He would go ent and seek the sinner to call him back.

Christmas is the delebration of that time...those times.. when God reached out thru the baby in a manger. "God 22 loved the world...."

In our day we have been impressed with man's accomplishments
- landing on the moon, transpolants of human organs, the amazing strides in communication - that we forget how much those
events pale in comparison to the significance of that time when
the God of all that lives, oves, and has its being, emptied
himself and became a tiny infant.

We are like therich man who was proud of his beautiful lawn "I had those trees moved right here to my lawn" he boasted, had them set in perfect geometric fashion this way". To which the pasotr murmered, " My, My, it just goes to show you what wonders God could perform if only he had money".

Before man begin his wandering on the earth and his disspecified pointing of it, the stars were already shining their lights of beauty, the oceans were already filled with teeming life, and God was already working out his purpose and plan for creation.

Christmas is the celebration of what God has done in Jesus Christ. Before the season is past, I hope you will recall those things God has done in your life. Whether or not you share those intimate moments with others or not, it is important for you to remember them.

Blaise Pascal had a remarkable spiritual experience in his room one night. He called it FIRE IN THE NIGHT and wrote about it. Then he sewed the written account into the lining of his coat. All the rest of his life he could feel and touch the crinkle of paper, but he never showed it to anyone. It was discovered after his death. Pascal understood that sometimes there are things which God gives us that are too intimate to share with anyone. They are part of us and our past and must be claimed and enjoyed as smoothing God has such to bring us to this point.

Christmas is a celebration of what God has done. It is also a celebration of what he will yet do. Paul does not say any—thing in his writings about the brith of Jesus, but he has a good deal to say about when Christ shall return. In Phillippians he writes: "Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice. Let your moderation be known to men. The Lord is at hand"

In 1916 the man whose invention led to the development pf
TV said: "...commercially and financially I consider television
an impossibility, a development of which we need spend little
time dreaming".

In 1949 a respected science magazine said: "Landing and

maring around the mean offers as many carries

moving about the moon offers so many serious problems for human beings, that it may take another 200 years for science to lick them".

Some predictions in 1970 said: Inflation will level off and average about 2%; two homes per family will become the norm. But in 1980 they predicted: Double digit inflation will continue. A marktie will dost \$48 by 1990, a McDonald's hamburger will cost \$5 and a small color TV will cost \$2000.

Who knows what the future will hold. Nobody knows. We only know who holds the future, and that is God. We need not fear the future. It remains to find that he was broke. It seemed to him life was at an end. His wife had died. He owed million. He was aprisoner in a sanatorium in Battle Creek Michigan. Penney wrote farewell notes and tried to take his own life but failed. Round the clock nurses were assigned to him. One day as his loneliness closed in on him more and more corrider he walked down the hospital coorider and heard singing coming from the chapel!

All you may need he will provide God will take care of you No matter what may be the test, God will take care of you.

Then he heard the text being read "Come to all who labor and a heavy laden, and I will give you rest".

Suddenly Penney was set free, and his life began anew.

That is the message we want to hear concerning the future: "No matter what may be the test, God will take care of you".

Christmas is a celebration of what God has done, it is a celebration of what he will yet do. But it is also a celebration of God's presnce here and now. "They shall call his name Emmanuel - God with us". Those who experience Christmas this year are the ones who will experience the rebirth of Christ in their hearts.

Carl Michalson, a brilleant young theologian died in a plane accident several years ago. He was fond of telling stories that explain the difference the eyes of faith make, He wrote:

I once over heard a British entertainer telling about her experiences toward the end of WW II. She was going from bedside to bedside in a Navy hospital. She came to one gailor who had lost both his eyes. She said to him: 'is there anythin I can do for you?" He replied, "Can you said? ! She said "Not every well but what would you like?" He said "Smiling She began singing and when she came to the lines 'those two eyes of blue come smiling thru' he stopped her and said: 'tell me, what khall I say to them when they ask me the color of my eyes? Shall I say they were blue or shall I say they are blue?" And she said, "You must tell them that they were blue", "O well", he said, "It doesn't matter. I have become a Christian and intend to be aminister and you do not need eyes to see God".

And Michalsen write: "That is just it. Nobody needs eyes

to see God, no eyes, but the eyes of faith. And what are the eyes of faith? The eyes of faith are the eyes that discern Jesus of Nazareth, the one in whom God chose to make himself present to us in our history and for our salvation."

How can we help but sing? No wonder the people were in great expectation, as Lake tells as, as they heard John the Baptist preach. God was ready to do something great in their lives.

God is seeking to do something great inyour life. Open yourself to Christmas. Open your \$ \$\frac{1}{2} \frac{1}{2} \frac{1}{2}
